Focuses on understanding the basic problems, needs, and strengths of all disability groups in relation to developing and implementing a therapeutic recreation program.

Upon completion of the class the student will gain knowledge and understanding of the responsibility of the interrelationship of the diverse leisure services delivery system, and the role of the professional in providing access to recreational opportunities to persons with disabilities. - 7. Upon completion of the course the students will have gained overview knowledge of terminology, and an understanding of the psychological, sociological, physiological, and historical significance of Therapeutic Recreation. (9D.02)
